Revenue for the Early Head Start and Head Start programs was \$10,425,053, of which \$778,274 and \$9,646,779 came from private and public sources, respectively. The budgetary expenditures of these programs included staff compensation and benefits, professional fees, supplies, occupancy and other expenditures in support of the provision of client services.
