## **Engaging Parents**

Children's Home & Aid has a "Parent Café" or "Parent Room" at each site where parents meet, network, and utilize computers for creating resumes, employment, and housing searches. Each month we offer a variety of opportunities for family involvement and participation, including Earth Day Events, Muffins with Moms, and Donuts with Dads.

We offer monthly parent workshops with topics such as Kindergarten Readiness and the Conscious Discipline Parent Education Curriculum, a social emotional curriculum guiding parents in regulating their own emotions to support their children's ability to regulate their emotions. Our Nurse Consultant facilitates workshops around communicable diseases and the importance of health, and our Mental Health Consultants host sessions on Routines and Redirection, Self-Care, Stress Management, and Healthy Transitions.

We also include parents in our School Readiness Committee and Health Service Advisory Committee meetings held three times per year.

### Financial information

Revenue for our Early Head Start and Head Start programs was \$12,022,407 of which \$3,961,980 was from non-federal public support, with \$8,060,427 from federal Early Head Start and Head Start funding. The budgetary expenditures of these programs included staff compensation and benefits, professional fees, supplies, occupancy and other expenditures in support of the provision of client services.
